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Welcome to Webelos Woods 2023. Webelos Woods is an overnight campout designed to introduce Webelos Scouts to the many outdoor adventures of Scouts BSA. This awesome event includes activity sessions with troops from Alpine district, fun evening campfires, and important information for parents and Webelos about transitioning to Scouts BSA. This is a great opportunity for Webelos Scouts and their parents to observe local troops in action.

Registration and Fees

Cost: Webelos/AOL Scout - \$40

Parent - \$10

Webelos Den Leader - \$10

A \$5 late fee will be added to registrations entered after Sept 15.

Why the different costs? Webelos/AOL Scouts pay for the scout program, facilities, lunch, and patches. Parents and Leaders pay for facilities, lunch, and parent program.

→ This is an overnight campout, Saturday 7:30am to Sunday 12:30pm. We are unable to accommodate day-only participants for this event.

Registration is completed through Tentaroo. Please register no later than Sept 22nd, so we have adequate time to plan campsites and purchase lunch food. Registration is limited to 78 AOL Webelos (5th Graders) and 42 Webelos 1 (4th Graders) and their parent(s). We are unable to accommodate siblings at this event.

It is recommended that packs use their *Tentaroo Pack Login* to register. The cubmaster or committee chair have been given the pack login credentials. – This is recommended for easier registration!

Your pack may request families register individually. Families will need to create an account (make sure to change the type of account to an individual account!). Note you cannot use the same email address for an individual account and a pack account.

During registration, each participant will indicate:

- Any dietary restrictions or needs for lunch
- 23-24 School Year Grade of youth participant

Required Forms

Every scout and adult attending need to complete and bring with them the following forms

Annual Health Medical Form Parts A and B only

According to BSA Policy, all Scouts and participating adults must complete an Annual Heath and Medical Record form (parts A&B only) for all Scouting activities. This is the health history form required for any short-term Scout activity. IT IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE UNIT to obtain and maintain copies of these forms for members of their unit for all activities they conduct. Medical forms will be reviewed at checkin and remain with the pack leader.

Our camp safety protocols are based on the requirements and recommendations of BSA National, Washington State Department of Health, and King County Department of Health. As of this writing, masks are not required at Chief Seattle Council Camps and Facilities.* Individuals still desiring to wear a mask are welcome to do so. Remember that risk still exists everywhere; our goals include managing those risks to serve our campers and their families in the safest manner possible.

*These procedures are subject to change. All safety protocols will be decided by the CDC management team and Chief Seattle Council health guidelines.

Camp Rules

Camp rules follow the Scout Law and common sense. Here are the details:

- 1. No camper is allowed to leave camp after check-in without a release from the camp director. They must be accompanied by an authorized adult while out of camp, and must sign out at the camp office before departing. Campers leaving early must be released to authorized persons only.
- 2. Do not cut or climb trees.
- 3. Campers must stay out of other campsites/cabins unless invited.
- 4. All fires must be tended.
- 5. No open flames of any kind in tents or sleeping huts.
- 6. All liquid fuels must be stored in the camp fuel locker in clearly marked containers. Liquid fuels must be used under adult supervision only.
- 7. No fireworks may be kept or used in camp. Those with fireworks will be sent home.
- 8. No personal firearms or fixed blade knives allowed.
- 9. No intoxicating beverages or illegal drugs are allowed on Scout property.
- 10. No dish washing in the restroom sinks.
- 11. Please leave your campsite, cabin, and restroom better than you found it.
- 12. Hand tools (such as axes, saws, shovels) must be used with adult supervision. Power tools may be used by qualified adults only.
- 13. No pets allowed in camp at any time.
- 14. Return borrowed wheelbarrows to the shed by the dining hall.
- 15. You are responsible for the behavior of your group and must provide adequate supervision.
- 16. The Buddy System must be used at all times.

Fire Safety & Prevention

Campfires are permitted only in the fire pit in your campsite and should never be left unattended. Proper methods to extinguish fires must be available at all times. When the fire is out cold, stack partially burnt wood near the pit for future use. Water buckets (filled with water) and fire tools must be conveniently placed near any campfire site. Campfires are permitted pending approval by state and county agencies.

Limited wood is available at camp, but may not be dry/seasoned. Feel free to bring your own wood and kindling if you local, from the west side of the mountains.

Camping and Meal Planning

- → Packs are responsible for their own food, except for Saturday lunch. Lunch on Saturday will be provided by camp staff, and is included in the cost of attending.
- → A sealed box and cooler are necessary to keep animals out of food.
- → Gluten Free and Veggie options are available for lunch. Be sure to indicate specific dietary restrictions or needs during registration. For the safety of individuals with severe food allergies, it is recommended they bring their own lunch.
- → Participants will be grouped with their pack and assigned a campsite appropriate for their group size. Small groups or lone scouts will be paired with another pack. All campsites are equipped with running water.
- → Tent camping recommended: families and packs provide their own tents and camping gear, including cooking equipment. Tent platforms are available at the campsites and fit most 2-3 person tents.
- → We recommend families tent together. Your pack/den can opt to have Scouts tent together. No adult can tent with any youth except their own child.
- → Picnic tables are available at the campsites; however, many are not covered. We recommend bringing pop-ups and tarps.
- → Garbage cans are available next to the restroom at each site. Plan to empty garbage cans into the camp dumpster before leaving camp at the end of the event.

- → Field Uniform (tan/blue shirt) is preferred for the opening and closing ceremonies each day.
- → Activity Uniform (Pack or scouting t-shirt) is preferred for the stations.

Camp Check-in Procedures

Check-in and Campsites

Check-in will take place at the covered patio between the dining hall and camp store. Walk up the hill from the parking lot into camp; the camp store and dining hall are the first buildings on the left.

Check-in staff will confirm that youth and adults have completed the Medical Form Part A & B and will hand out participant packets. Packets include campsite assignment, maps, schedule, and activity station passports.

Pack leaders will receive a pack packet. This will have information for fire safety procedures, bathroom etiquette, patches, instructions for updating Scoutbook with adventure requirements, and a checkout checklist and supplies.

Campsites are approximately .5 - .75 miles uphill from the parking lot. Wheel barrels are available to share. Bring a collapsible wagon if you have more gear than you can carry in one trip.

Camp Setup Time

Please arrive as early as possible between 7:30 and 8:30 AM on Saturday. Packs have until 9:40 to carry items from the parking lot and set up camp before reporting for opening flags and starting activity stations. The more time you allot your family for travel between campsites and parking lot and for setup, the more enjoyable your weekend will be.

Checkout Procedure

Before leaving each pack will complete the checkout list provided in the pack packet.

Before Webelos Woods

Part of Webelos Woods is learning about and practicing the patrol method, which is an essential component of Scout BSA program. Patrols are teams of scouts that complete activities together, such as planning outings, eating, and camping together. The following are activities dens should complete prior to coming to camp.

Webelos I Cast Iron Chef Requirement 1 (4th Graders)

Cast Iron Chef will be covered by a troop briefly in one of the sessions, to get the most out of the adventure scouts will work on the adventure as a den before and during camp.

With your patrol, discuss what meals to eat at camp. Patrols need to plan for Saturday dinner and Sunday breakfast and lunch.

Let the Scouts brainstorm. Have a patrol "scribe" write down suggestions for each meal. What do they want to eat? Are there any food allergies or restrictions that need to be considered during planning? What must be purchased? What equipment is needed to cook it? They should do as much of the cooking as possible (with your guidance, of course). Does the menu cover all food groups and provide nutrition? Unless a scout has a severe diet restriction, all scouts in the group should be included in the planning. If a separate meal is required to keep a scout safe, try to make both meals similar.

Be mindful that this is the Scouts' choice (not the parents) and let them decide on what they will eat at camp, guiding them to cover all the food groups.

Troop Patrols do this activity for every campout. Practicing now will give Webelos a head start on knowing what to expect when they reach Scouts BSA. Adults (parents) of the older Scouts in a Troop typically choose to cook and eat their own food (for obvious reasons).

Tending camp should be the responsibility of the Scouts. Really. We're serious. Except for lighting stoves and some of the other adult work, let them cook, clean, set up tents, etc. Create a duty roster listing everything that needs to be done, who will do it, and when. Some responsibilities are cooking, campfire starting and tending, getting water, etc. (Note: we encourage going "green" by using mess kits and water bottles that can be cleaned and reused instead of disposables.) Delegate adult responsibilities, too, since you will need to help them prepare the food, watch over a campfire, etc. Everyone rotates to a new position after doing it once. Share the load.

AOL Scouting Adventure Requirement 1 (5th Graders)

Troops start and end every meeting/event reciting the Scout Oath, Scout Law, and Outdoor Code. Practice this several times before Webelos Woods, as the event will start and end following this tradition. Also review the meaning of each scout law principle, here is a great resource https://scoutsmarts.com/12-scout-law-principles/

AOL Scouting Adventure Requirement 3 (5th Graders)

Form a patrol with your fellow Webelos Scout that will be attending Webelos Woods with you. Decide on a patrol name and patrol leader. Optionally, create a patrol cheer and flag. Visit this Scouting Magazine Blog for patrol name and design inspiration.

AOL Outdoor Adventure Requirement 1 (5th Graders)

Follow the Webelos Handbook to create your campout plan.

Discuss what they will need to bring on the trip. Personal items like clothes, tents, sleeping bag, sun, and rain protection, etc. What are the essentials? What will be for comfort? Consider first aid, cold temperatures, and hydration.

During Webelos Woods

Cast Iron Chef Requirement 2 (4th Graders)

Use some of the skills you learned at the Cast Iron Chef station to prepare a balanced meal for your den or family. If possible, use one of these methods for preparation of part of the meal: camp stove, Dutch oven, box oven, solar oven, open campfire, or charcoal grill. Demonstrate an understanding of food safety practices while preparing the meal.

Use your duty roster created before camp to share the load of this activity between participants.

Don't forget cleanup is part of this requirement (even if not explicitly stated)!

Passports

Upon arrival to camp, scouts will be given a map, schedule, station rotations, and an Adventure Passport. Upon completing each station, troops will sign the passport for each scout. At the end of the activities, scouts can bring completed passports to the dining hall for a special gift.

After Webelos Woods

Scoutbook Updates for Adventures and Awards

Pack Leaders are responsible for entering the completed activities in Scoutbook and awarding the Webelos and AOL pins to the scouts. Adventures completed are listed on the scouts Webelos Woods Passport. Be sure to award these pins at camp or at the next pack/den meeting so that they can proudly show the friends, family, and younger scouts all they accomplished at Webelos Woods.

Stronger, Faster, Higher Adventure Requirement 3 (4th Graders)

Scouts need to record their activities for 30 days and report progress to their den leader or parent to complete this requirement.

Scouting Adventure Requirement 4 (5th Graders)

By participating in Webelos Wood, you have completed requirement 4. Congratulations! Many troops host additional outings such as hikes for Webelos (a great way to work on your Webelos Walkabout adventure). Reach out to local troops and get their upcoming schedule of hikes or other outings. Alpine District troop contact information is listed at the end of this document.

Scouting Adventure Requirement 2 (5th Graders)

Reach out to the Troops you are interested in joining and request to visit a troop meeting. If you were unable to identify troops in your area at Webelos Woods, check with your den leader or contact your District Executive. Alpine District Executive is Gillian Suhre GSuhre@seattlebsa.org.

Remember to ask troops when they are going to summer camp. All troops schedule summer camp a year in advance. Many new scouts end up missing the first year of summer camp because they did not know camp dates early enough. The information is available if you ask.

Parent Meeting

Saturday at 4pm parents are invited (and highly encouraged) to attend the Webelos to Scouts BSA Transition presentation. Two adults are required to stay with scouts during free time. All other parents should be at the parent meeting. Parent attendance is required for Packs to earn the Honor Pack Award at the end of camp.

Pack Free Time

Saturday at 4pm is a time for Webelos to play games, such as gaga ball or card games, visit the camp store, or explore camp. Be sure that scouts know the boundaries of the camp, to stay with a buddy, and know they need to be back at 5pm to prepare for dinner. Some troops may offer activities during this time, offerings will be announced the morning of camp.

Interfaith Service

Our Interfaith Service is presented by the troops and highlights the Scout Law, showing appreciation and gratitude for what we have, and includes a time for reflection from our weekend activities. Packs are required to attend the Interfaith Service to earn the Honor Pack Award.

Troop Presentations and Gear Expo

Following the Interfaith Service (same location), troop youth and adult leaders will share a few highlights about their troop. Afterward families will be invited to visit the dining hall for personal visits with troops and to check out the Gear Expo. The Gear Expo will have a variety of camping items you can check out and ask questions about.

Relay Competition

New this year! Our final event of the weekend will start at the Parade Field at 10am. Packs will compete in a relay competition that will take them across camp to complete a variety of tasks using skills they learned over the weekend. Be prepared to tie knots, start a fire, identify plants/animals, and shoot the target to earn the Alpine Webelos Woods 2023 Trophy.

Closing Ceremony

At the conclusion of the Relay Competition everyone will meet at the Parade Field for awards and closing ceremony. After the closing ceremony, camp will be dismissed, and groups will pack and clean their campsites. Remember to complete the checkout checklist and deliver it to staff at the dining hall before leaving camp.

Honor Pack Award Specifics

New this year! This is a summer camp tradition for Scout Troops that we want to introduce our Webelos Scouts to. Each summer camp location has their own requirements to earn the honor troop ribbon and can include being on time for open/closing ceremonies and meals, attending different activities offered at camp, completing a service project, and a variety of other tasks. If earned, the honor troop ribbon is attached to the troop flag. It is meant to be challenging, not every troop will earn this award at camp. Can your pack earn the Honor Pack Ribbon at Webelos Woods to take back to your pack and add to your pack flag? It won't be easy – but you can do it!



FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What if my scout doesn't have a field uniform (Blue/Tan Shirt), can they still attend?

Yes, scouts can wear their activity uniform (pack or Scouting t-shirt) if they do not yet have a field uniform. Either uniform is acceptable at camp.

Can we come during the day on Saturday and not spend the night?

No, this is an overnight camp. Camping is part of the experience of this camp. It is essential to prepare your scouts for Scouts BSA. Check the Chief Seattle program website for alternative day program options. https://seattlebsa.org/camping/quide/

What meals are provided?

Saturday lunch is provided at camp. All other meals are to be planned, brought, and prepared by the participants.

Will there be a vegetarian option for lunch?

Yes, we will have Veggie Burgers available. Participants will indicate their dietary needs during registration to insure we have enough for everyone.

Is there a fire ring at our campsite?

Every campsite has a fire ring.

Are we allowed to have a campfire? Is wood available for a fire?

Check local regulations for burn bans. If there is no burn ban, campfires are allowed. Wood is available on site. You need to bring or make your own kindling and fire starter.

Is there an older scout assigned to each campsite in case we need assistance (meaning, where the stations are located, for questions, etc.)?

The stations are centrally located, very close to the parade field and dining hall where we will have opening ceremony. The BB range is the only station that is farther away, and there are good signs to get you there. We have asked for Pack Guides from our troops and OA, but we are not sure if we have enough volunteers to make it happen. Feel free to ask any Troop Leader or Camp Staff for help at any time.

Can each family register individually and we are still put together?

It is recommended that you register together as a pack using your pack Tentaroo login. That being said, yes, families can register individually. There will be a space for them to enter their pack number. Packs will be together at the same campsite. Your Webelos I den will do activities together and your AOL Den will do activities together.

What type of accommodation would be available for a group with 10 scouts plus parents? The flyer mentions tent; 2-person cabins and Adirondacks.

Yes, we will have a campsite to accommodate your group size. Campsites are assigned by camp staff in September after registration closes. We will tell you your site when you arrive. Every campsite has several 2-3 person stents (a raised platform with a canvas covering), a few have Adirondacks (cabins with 8 bunks). There is space for personal tents as well. Every family should bring a tent. They may or may not need it.
