ON THE AIR

Jamboree-on-the-Air, or JOTA, is the largest Scouting event in the world. It is held annually the third full weekend in October. JOTA uses amateur radio to link Scouts and hams around the world, around the nation, and in your own community. This jamboree requires no travel, other than to a nearby amateur radio operator's ham shack. Many times you can find the hams will come to you by setting up a station at your Scout camporee, at the park down the block, or perhaps at a ham shack already set up at your council's camp.

ON THE INTERNET

Jamboree-on-the-Internet, or JOTI, is an annual international Scouting event sponsored by the World Organization of the Scout Movement. Each year, during the third weekend in October, Scouts from around the world gather online to learn about other cultures and the activities in which other Scouts participate. They communicate with each other using Internet-enabled devices such as computers, laptops, tablets, and mobile phones. Last year, JOTA-JOTI had over 1.5 million Scouts and leaders participate in more than 160 countries!

INTERAMERICAN LEADERSHIP TRAINING

When you're in the Scout Movement, certain people and places hold a special place in your heart. Maybe it's your closest tentmate or your first resident camp. When they come into your thoughts, they make you pause and think about how grateful you are to be involved in such an amazing organization and to be around so many unique, amazing people. For us, we now have over 70 new people and a school about 1.5 hours from Panama City, Panama, to cherish for the rest of our lives.

At the 7th Interamerican Leadership Training, we problem-solved, connected, and brainstormed with Scouts from across the Interamerican Region of the World Organization of the Scout Movement, from El Salvador to Dominica to Uruguay. In the span of six days, we laughed (we are definitely bringing some of these scout songs back to the BSA),



argued (every team's going to storm!), cried (the last day was pretty bittersweet), sweat (Panama was HOT, folks), ate new foods (plantains are delicious), and experienced cultures that differ from our own (and we even shared some US scout staples: trail mix and s'mores).

Each on our own teams (Lyndsey on team Red and Charles on team Cyan), we created and developed Messengers of Peace projects that all of our teammates will bring back to our home countries. Lyndsey's team's project is titled, "Better Start." Her team created this project to offer sufficient support for underprivileged





INTERNATIONAL SPIRIT AWARD

The International Spirit Award is a temporary emblem that is awarded to registered Scouts and Scouters who have completed the necessary requirements, have gained a greater knowledge of international Scouting, and have developed a greater appreciation and awareness of different cultures and countries. This award serves as a replacement for, and therefore eliminates, the International Activity emblem and the Youth Exchange emblem. The International Spirit Award emblem is \$4.00 each and is purchased from the International Department.

Please fill out the application with the date that each requirement was completed. All requirements must be met within 5 years from the start to completion of the award. Please mail the completed and signed application with a \$4.00 check made out to "BSA" to the International Department, S340, PO Box 152079, Irving, TX 75015.

- Serve as a registered adult leader with a Direct Service, Far East Council, or Transatlantic

II. Giving Leadership to International Events Held in the United States Date Completed

- Host Scouts/Scouters (minimum of three visitors per group) from another country at your local council camp as part of an official national, council, district, or unit activity. Please note that hosting in private homes is not considered an official Scouting activity.
- Serve on the international staff at a national Scout jamboree.
- Assist in the International Camp Staff program. Be responsible for bringing a foreign Scout on staff to the council's summer camp program for two summer camp seasons.

III. Giving Leadership to International Events Held in Other Countries Date Completed

- Serve as an adult leader in a BSA contingent to a world Scout jamboree or Interamerican Scout jamboree.
- Serve as an adult leader for a group of BSA Scouts participating in an event held by a foreign Scout association recognized by the World Organization of the Scout Movement. The activity may be an exchange program, camp experience, or a tour activity.
- Serve on the international service staff of a world Scout jamboree.
